

# Twinings Darjeeling

**Twinings Darjeeling, in summary:** The multi-garden, supermarket-tier Darjeeling blend: lighter and more floral than English Breakfast, and an easy entry point before single-estate.

Twinings Darjeeling is the brand's accessible, supermarket-tier take on the so-called Champagne of teas, for drinkers who want Darjeeling character without a £15 single-estate tin. It is lighter and brighter than mass-market British [black tea](#), carrying some of the floral, grape-skin muscatel note that earned the region its nickname. A worthwhile step up from standard [English Breakfast](#) for refined [afternoon](#) drinking.

Twinings Darjeeling uses broken-leaf Darjeeling, mostly second flush (the May to June harvest with the strongest muscatel character). It is less refined than single-estate first flush but far more accessible at [supermarket](#) pricing. Because it is blended from several Darjeeling gardens, cup-to-cup consistency is good even if the depth is shallower than a single estate.

## How it tastes

Lighter than English Breakfast or [Yorkshire](#), with a brighter coppery liquor and an aromatic top note that hints at the muscatel grape-skin character of premium Darjeeling. Less astringent than other Indian blacks and more aromatic; the signature perfume comes through if you let the cup cool slightly before drinking.

## How to brew

1. 1 bag in 200ml water just off the boil; let it cool a minute, as a full boil scorches Darjeeling.
2. Cover the cup; the volatile aromatics that give Darjeeling its character escape easily.
3. Steep 3 minutes only. Darjeeling turns astringent past 4 minutes, the most common Darjeeling brewing mistake.
4. Drink black, with a slice of lemon if you like; milk masks the muscatel character.
5. Use porcelain or glass if you can, so you can see the golden-amber liquor.

Darjeeling grows in West Bengal, in the Himalayan foothills at 600 to 2000m. The district makes under 1% of India's tea but is its most prized, and the name is geographic-indication protected like Champagne or Roquefort. Nineteenth-century importers coined the "Champagne of teas" tag for its muscatel, wine-like character. There are three harvests: first flush (March to April, lightest and most aromatic), second flush (May to June, balanced and the most exported), and autumnal flush (October to November, fullest in body).

## Twinings versus single-estate Darjeeling

The Twinings cup is a multi-garden blend rather than a single-estate, single-flush tea, so it trades garden-and-season character for batch consistency. For the price tier it is acceptable rather than exceptional. Serious Darjeeling drinkers move to single-estate first flush from specialist importers, or to [Teapigs Darjeeling](#) in a whole-leaf pyramid bag, for the nuance the mainstream blend smooths out.

## Use cases

- Afternoon tea, particularly with light cake or scones.
- A refined daily cup for those who skip milk and sugar.
- A lighter alternative to English Breakfast.
- An easy introduction to Darjeeling for drinkers used to Yorkshire or Tetley.
- Pairing with light fish, chicken, or salad lunches.

## FAQ

**Caffeine?** 30 to 45mg per cup, lower than Yorkshire because Darjeeling grows slowly at altitude.

**Milk?** Possible, but milk masks the muscatel character. Drink black for the full experience.

**Steep time?** 3 minutes; Darjeeling becomes astringent past 4.

**Compared to Teapigs Darjeeling?** Teapigs is a whole-leaf temple bag, premium tier, more aromatic.

**Which flush?** Mostly second flush; check the pack for flush labelling on premium variants.

Buy [Twinings Darjeeling](#) as the everyday supermarket-shelf option. For a premium upgrade try [Teapigs Darjeeling single-garden pyramid bag](#), a [first-flush Darjeeling](#) from a specialist (the spring harvest, lightest and most floral), or a [second-flush Darjeeling](#) for the maltier variant. For the wider Indian-tea context, pair with a quality [Assam single-origin](#).

**FROM THE CURATOR** *teas* · Freshness beats provenance for most drinkers. Buy a smaller bag more often.

## The bottom line

Twinings Darjeeling is the supermarket-shelf, multi-garden Darjeeling: an acceptable everyday cup, lighter and more floral than English Breakfast and more delicate than Assam. Enthusiasts will find it too smoothed-out and should go single-estate first flush; for a first taste of Darjeeling it is the easy entry point, with Teapigs the obvious next step.

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
