

Can you take a flask of tea through airport security?

Empty: yes. Full: no. Brewed tea is a liquid, so it has to obey whatever liquid rule your departure airport is running that week — and even where large bottles are now allowed, metal and insulated flasks have their own rule because scanners cannot see through them.

The practical answer for almost everyone: empty the flask before security, take your teabags through as dry food, and fill up after the checkpoint.

Airport rules checked: 17 September 2026. Check your own airport before you fly.

What the rules look like right now

Most UK airports still apply the 100ml limit; some have moved to 2 litres with the new scanners. GOV.UK confirms both situations exist side by side. [GOV.UK: hand luggage restrictions](#)

Airport	Liquid container limit	Flask rule
Heathrow	Up to 2 litres, kept in your bag	Metal and insulated bottles must be empty
Gatwick	Up to 2 litres	Not in metal or double-walled containers
Manchester	100ml per container	Reusable containers need the capacity printed on them

Two things follow from that table. First, the limit is about the **size of the container**, not how much is in it: a 500ml bottle with two mouthfuls of tea in it is still a 500ml container. Second, a vacuum flask is judged on being metal and double-walled, not on its capacity, so "it's only 350ml" does not help.

Dry tea is a different matter

Teabags, loose leaf and matcha powder are food, not liquids. They travel in hand luggage without a limit. Powders can trigger extra screening, so keep matcha in its labelled tin rather than a food bag, and be ready to take it out. [Can you take teabags on a plane](#) covers the wider journey.

The kit that works

- **An empty flask**, dried out, packed where you can grab it. Fill it after security — most UK airports have water fountains — or ask a café to fill it.
- **Teabags in their box**, or a few in a labelled bag.
- **A travel infuser** for loose leaf. See our [travel tea infuser](#) guide.
- **A cup you can brew in**, if your flask is not wide-mouthed.

Coming back, and stopping on the way

Check the rules for every airport you pass through, not just the one you leave from. A drink bought after security at one airport can be taken off you at the next checkpoint on a connection, and your return airport may run a different rule from your departure one.

Duty-free liquids are handled separately under their own sealed-bag arrangements.

Common questions

Can I take a flask of tea if it is only half full?

No. The container size is what counts, and metal or double-walled flasks have to be empty regardless.

Can I freeze tea to get it through?

No. Frozen liquids are not exempt in hand luggage.

Can I take a flask in checked luggage?

Yes, but empty it: a full flask can leak or burst as pressure and temperature change in the hold.

What about a cup of tea I bought airside?

That is fine to carry onto the plane from the same terminal, but not through a second security checkpoint on a connecting flight.

Will they take my matcha off me?

Very unlikely. Powders are allowed; they may just be swabbed or scanned separately.

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
