Tea equipment, in summary: Tea equipment is mostly optional refinement around two essentials: heat the water, give the leaf room.

Tea equipment ranges from minimal (kettle + mug) to elaborate (matcha kit, gongfu setup, Yixing teapots). The right equipment matters less than people think for daily British [black tea](#) but more than expected for premium specialty teas. £20-50 buys complete entry level setup that lasts years.

The minimum viable tea setup

- Electric kettle (any)
- Mug (any)
- Tea bags or loose leaf tea

That's enough for daily British black tea drinking. Most British households use exactly this.

The recommended starter setup

- Variable temperature kettle (£40-100) OR standard kettle
- Teapot (600-800ml, glass or ceramic, £15-30)
- Basket infuser (£10-15) for single mug loose leaf brewing
- Fine mesh strainer (£5)
- Tea storage tin (£5-15)

- Quality mug

Total: £40-80 of equipment that lasts years.

Equipment by tea type

For British black tea (everyday)

Kettle + mug + tea bag. That's it.

For loose leaf black tea

Add basket infuser or teapot.

For [green tea](#)

Variable temperature kettle helpful (75-80°C) but not essential. Boil and wait works.

For matcha

Bamboo whisk (chasen, £8-15) + wide bowl + sifter. [More on matcha.](#)

For gongfu brewing

Gaiwan (£10-30) OR Yixing teapot (£20-100+) + small cups + cha hai (pitcher) + cha pan (tray). [More on gongfu.](#)

For [cold brew](#)

Lidded jug or jar (£5-15). Optional cold brew bottle with built in strainer.

The kettle question

Standard electric kettle

Boils water; that's it. Adequate for black tea, [herbal tea](#), oolong. £15-50.

Variable temperature kettle

Sets specific [temperature](#). Useful for green tea (75-80°C) and [white tea](#) (80-85°C). £40-100.

Premium variable temp kettle

Fellow Stagg, Cuisinart specialty kettles. £100-200. Quality build; precise temperature.

Stovetop kettle

Whistling kettles or Le Creuset cast iron. Aesthetic choice; slower than electric.

The teapot question

Glass teapot

£15-30. Lets you watch leaves unfurl. Beautiful for jasmine pearls or oolong. Some come with built in glass infuser.

Ceramic / porcelain teapot

£15-50. Traditional British. Holds heat well.

Cast iron teapot (tetsubin style)

£30-100. [Japanese](#) tradition. Holds heat extremely well.

Yixing clay teapot

£30-200. Chinese specialty for gongfu. Each pot dedicated to one tea type.

The infuser question

Basket infuser (recommended)

£5-15. Sits in mug. Allows leaves to expand. Best general purpose.

Mesh ball / tea egg

£3-8. Cheap; suboptimal extraction (leaves can't expand fully).

Brewing basket with lid

£10-25. Larger basket for in mug brewing with lid as drip tray.

Cotton / silicone reusable bags

£5-15 for set. Eco friendly. Slightly slower brewing.

The matcha equipment

Bamboo whisk (chasen)

£8-15. Essential for matcha. Kitchen whisks don't work.

Matcha bowl (chawan)

Or any wide ceramic bowl 12-15cm wide. £10-30 for specific bowl.

Sifter

Small fine mesh sieve. £3-10.

Bamboo scoop (chashaku)

Optional; ½ teaspoon works.

Storage equipment

Tea tins (caddies)

£5-20. Airtight, opaque. Standard storage.

Glass jars with rubber gaskets

£5-15. Good seal but UV vulnerable; keep in cupboard.

Vacuum sealed bags

£10-30. Excellent for long term storage.

Premium specialty equipment

Cha pan (tea tray)

For gongfu brewing. Catches spills; allows water pouring over the pot. £20-80.

Cha hai (fairness pitcher)

For gongfu. Pour brewed tea into pitcher; pour from pitcher to cups. £10-30.

Tea pet

Small clay figurine for gongfu trays. Decorative tradition. £5-30.

Tea timer

£5-20. Helpful for timing steeps precisely.

Thermometer for water

£10-30. Useful before variable temp kettles became affordable.

For most British drinkers, daily tea drinking needs:

- Electric kettle
- One favourite mug
- Basic teapot for visitors / weekend
- Basket infuser if loose leaf occasional

£30-50 of equipment lasts decades. Don't over invest unless serious tea exploration is the goal.

FAQ

Best tea equipment for beginners? Variable temperature kettle + glass teapot + basket infuser. £50-80 total.

Do I need a Yixing teapot? Only for gongfu Chinese specialty tea drinking.

Bamboo whisk for matcha? Yes, kitchen whisks don't work properly.

Storage equipment essential? Airtight tin in cool dark cupboard. Even original packaging works if it re seals.

Where to buy? UK kitchen retailers; specialist tea shops; Asian groceries for value.

Curator's note: tea equipment matters less than people think for daily British tea drinking, more than expected for premium specialty. £50 of equipment is enough for most. Don't over invest unless serious tea exploration is the goal. Lee, Teas.co.uk, Tunbridge Wells.

Tier	Kit	The read
Minimum viable	A kettle and any vessel with a way to hold leaf	Good tea brewed here beats bad tea anywhere

Tier	Kit	The read
Recommended starter	Kettle, a teapot or large infuser, a timer	The 90% setup; everything after is refinement
Green/delicate	Variable-temp kettle helps most here	Off-boil control is the real upgrade
Matcha	Bowl and whisk (or a small frother)	The one tea with a genuine kit requirement
Storage	Airtight, opaque caddy	Cheap, and protects everything you buy

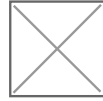
